OFFICIAL LAUNCH OF THE GCSAYN **ROAD TO THE IYRP 2026 CONSULTATIONS**

























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1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Climate Smart Agriculture Youth Network Global (GCSAYN) successfully hosted the official launch of its "Road to the International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists (IYRP) 2026" consultations on November 21, 2025. The virtual event brought together a distinguished panel of experts, scientists, and academic leaders from across the globe to mobilize GCSAYN's extensive network of 88 Centers of Excellence in 178 countries.

2.0 INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The United Nations' endorsement of 2026 as the International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists (IYRP) provides a critical platform to highlight the importance of these ecosystems and communities. GCSAYN builds upon its foundational work, notably the East African Regional Consultation in September 2022 supported by ILRI, which led to the establishment of the African Youth Pastoralist Initiative (https://csaynglobal.org/african-youth-pastoral-initiative/).

This official launch marks the beginning of GCSAYN's formal journey towards IYRP 2026, outlining a structured plan to amplify voices of pastoralists and leverage scientific research for sustainable rangeland management.





- Pastoralism sustains over 200 million livelihoods globally
- Rangelands cover 54% of world's land surface
- IYRP 2026 is a UN-mandated opportunity to elevate pastoral voices
- Objective: integrate pastoralism into global sustainability agenda

- **Saving Indigenous Breeds:** Kongu Matai, Umblachery, Burgur Breeds at risk, genetic biodiversity = climate resilience
- Soil & Carbon Benefits: Dung economy enriches soil organically, pastoral systems sequester carbon naturally
- Cultural & Livelihood Protection: Pastoralism = cultural identity + plus sustainable income. Red green meat: sustainable protein source
